I regret that our construction gang should have gone ahead and started work without the necessary permission, and assure you that it was entirely unintentional. We hereby make application to set two (2) \$6 wires on about ten of your poles on the north side of Cass Lake curve, and to set eighteen (18) poles on the north side of your right-of-way east of said curve. This line is to serve some summer cottages along Sylven Lake. and it is practically impossible to reach them in any other way. It is understood that this Company will assume any damages that may arise due to our wires or poles being on your right-of-way. and that the work will be done subject to your inspection and approval.

On going over the Orchard Lake Division, we find that the Eastern Michigan Edison Company have set some eighteen or twenty poles during the past two or three weeks on our right of way between the east end of Tass Lake Curve and Cottage Station Stop, there being fourteen poles on the north side of the right or way east of the Cass Lake Curve and four on the east side south of the Cottage Station.

These poles are 30 and 35 feet in length and are set nine feet from the outside edge of the nearest rail to tenter of poles and support one four pin crossarm.

From all appearances your construction crew expect to set more of these poles. I have no doubt but what this matter would work out alright, but I would far prefer to have your Company take this matter up in the regular manner as we can have a record of it.

Would you kindly investigate and advise?
